36 Descendants Join In On The Project Along College Street

There's no way of knowing what circumstances surrounded the construction of the Babb log home by Seth Babb Sr. back in 1787.

But it's likely the Revolutionary War veteran would have been amazed to see 36 of his descendants gathered nearly 225 years later for the reconstruction of the very same house, in downtown Greeneville.

Members of the Babb family came from far and wide to pitch in on the project, which some called a labor of love.

The reconstructed home, to be known as the "Babb Homestead," will be located in Fox Park along Richland Creek, near College Street.

The approximately 22-foot-by-24-foot structure will be on permanent loan to the nearby Nathanael Greene Museum, and will eventually be open to the public.

WASHINGTON D.C. — The federal government will conduct the first nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) on Wednesday, Nov. 9, at 2 p.m., it has been announced.

The test will last about 30 seconds. During this period, regularly sched-

EAA's 'Young Eagles' Event Introduced Young People To Flight On Saturday

Dennis Smith is hoping to join the Air Force after high school. His friend Jeffrey Newkirk plans a career in aeronautical engineering.

So it's no surprise the Greeneville teenagers were among the first to arrive Saturday morning at the Greeneville-Greene County Municipal Airport to participate in the "Young Eagles First Flight" program, which allowed them and 43 other local youths ages 8 through 17 the opportunity to get a free ride in a private aircraft.

The rides "give youth new perspective on the world and life in gener-

al," according to program organizers.

A waiting room at the airport was overflowing with young people and their parents Saturday as the five volunteer pilots participating in this year's Young Eagles program waited for the morning fog to lift.

"There's a whole roomful. During the day, we hope to have 80 or 90 (participants)," said Sherry Hensley, Young Eagles coordinator.

The small private aircraft used in the program each carried one to three youths aloft for about a 20-minute flight. Before taking off, the pilots briefed the youths about
